William Hassey was born May 30 1619 in Chelsea, Suffolk, England. He married Sarah Seward around 1654. He died May 20 1689 Wakefield, Middlesex, Massachusetts. He arrived in New England in 1652.

William Hasey was a lieutenant in the Three County Troop and a commander in King Phillip's War. Sarah Seward was the daughter of John Seward and Mary Sarah Cooke, who were from Bermondsey, Surrey, England. William Hasey married Judith, the widow of Captain Jonathan Poole, after Sarah's death in 1680. William Hasey died in 1689.

Some of their descendants include:

Phineas Sprague, who married Sarah Hasey in 1670 and was a prominent citizen of Malden, Massachusetts. Henry Green, who married Esther Hasse in 1672 and was a deacon of the church in Reading, Massachusetts. William Hasey, who was killed in the Battle of Bloody Brook in 1676 during King Phillip's War. Asa Hasey, who married Hannah Gould in 1683 and was a selectman of Reading, Massachusetts.

Joseph Hasey, who married Mary Bancroft in 1684 and was a lieutenant of the militia in Reading, Massachusetts

William's wife Sarah died Dec 1680.

Esther Hasse, daughter of William Hasey (Hassey, Hussey) andwas born 20 Mar 1649/50 in what is now Winthrop, Suffolk, Massachusetts which over the centuries has been Pulling Point, part of Boston, and then Chelsea before finally Winthrop (see below). She married Henry Green 11 Nov 1671 in Malden, Middlesex County, Massachusetts.

Winthrop (Pullen Poynt (Pulling Point))

Winthrop was settled in 1630 by English Puritan colonists as Pullen Poynt (Pulling Point), so named because the tides made hard pulling for boatmen. The present town is named after John Winthrop (1587–1649), second governor of the Massachusetts Bay Colony and an English Puritan leader. On April 8, 1630, Winthrop departed from the Isle of Wight, England on the ship Arbella, arriving in Salem in June where he was met by John Endecott, the first governor of the colony. John Winthrop served as governor for twelve of the colony's first twenty years of existence. It was he who decided to base the colony at the Shawmut Peninsula, where he and other colonists founded what is now the City of Boston.



Originally part of an area called Winnisimmet by the native Massachusetts tribe, Pullen Poynt was annexed by the Town of Boston in 1632 and was used as a grazing area. In 1739, what is now Chelsea, Revere, and Winthrop, withdrew from Boston due to governmental control disputes and became the Town of Chelsea. Revere and Winthrop seceding from Chelsea in 1846 to become North Chelsea. Shortly thereafter, in 1852, Winthrop was incorporated as a town in its own right with a Board of Selectmen and Open Town Meeting form of government. Winthrop is now legally a city, with legislative powers vested in an elected Town Council.
